He reported that there are not a lot of individuals without homes in Orrville, and that most of those individuals are on their way to Wooster to receive services or are made aware that resources are available there. Laura said Goodwill does a homelessness survey twice a year, but it is hard to get an accurate count because if someone says they have somewhere to go then they are not able to be counted. Coalition Education	Advocacy vs. Lobbying	 Staff reviewed the differences between advocacy and lobbying due to Ohio Issue 2 being on the 2023 ballot in November. Advocacy is the act or process of supporting a cause or proposal, and lobbying is attempting to influence a lawmaker. As a coalition, we are allowed to advocate but not lobby. The Ohio Lobbying Handbook has three triggers that identify an advocacy effort as lobbying. These triggers include receiving compensation for the activity in question, direct communication with a legislative reportable person, and at least 5% of compensated time being spent on attempting to influence legislation. 	 Ohio Issue 2 will decide whether recreation marijuana use will be legal in Ohio. We are not allowed to take a stance on the issue, but we are able to provide information about the effects of marijuana.
